# As the campaign kicks off, Liberals lead by 5 over Conservatives as the NDP rises to 22%

AUGUST 18, 2021


We just completed a national survey of 1,500 Canadian adults (August 12 to 16) with about 30% of the interviews done after the election announcement on Sunday.

Here's what we are seeing:

#### MOOD OF THE COUNTRY

There's been a five-point drop in the number of Canadians feeling the country is headed in the right direction, as the number of COVID cases rise over the last week. Now, 41% feel the country is headed in the right direction while 42% feel it's off on the wrong track.

Views about the direction of the US and the world also have become more negative since last week as events in Afghanistan and the 4th wave in the US dominate news coverage.



### FEELINGS ABOUT THE PANDEMIC

This downward shift in mood is likely attributable to growing concerns about the COVID-19 pandemic. When asked whether they are getting more or less worried about the pandemic over the past few days, 38% say they are getting more worried – up 5-points in a week, and 23-points in a month. Today, 24% believe the worst of the pandemic is still to come (a 9point increase in a month).




As the campaign kicks off, Liberals lead by 5 over Conservatives as the NDP rises to 22%




# GOVERNMENT APPROVAL

Today 44% approve of the job being done by the Trudeau government, while 41% disapprove – a 4-point increase in those disapproving over the past week.



# LEADER IMPRESSIONS

Justin Trudeau enjoys a positive impression among 40% and negative impressions among 44%, for a net score of -3. Negative impressions of Mr. Trudeau are up 3-points since last week.



Jagmeet Singh enjoys a positive impression among 39% and finds negative impressions among 24% for a net +15. Impressions of Mr. Singh are largely unchanged from last week.




Erin O'Toole enjoys a positive impression among 20% and finds negative impressions among 41%, for a net score of -21. Impressions of Mr. O'Toole are also largely unchanged from last week.



## HOW DOES THIS TRANSLATE INTO VOTE INTENTION?

If an election were held now, the Liberals would win 33% of the vote (down 4 from our last measurement point), the Conservatives 28% (unchanged), the NDP 22% (up 2), the Green Party 5% (unchanged) and the BQ at 31% in Quebec (9-points higher than in our last survey).




- In BC, we find a three-way race with the Liberals at 31%, the Conservatives at 30%, and the NDP at 29%. The Greens are at 7%.
- In Alberta, 39% would vote Conservative compared with 29% for the NDP and 23% for the Liberals, and 6% for the People's Party.
- In Manitoba and Saskatchewan, the Conservatives lead the Liberals and NDP by almost 30 points, 48% to 19% and 19%.

• The Liberals (with 36%) have a 6-point lead over the Conservatives (30%) in Ontario, with the NDP at 24% and the Green Party at 5%. The People's Party is at 5% in Ontario.

• In Quebec, we see the Liberals with 34%, followed by the BQ (31%), the Conservatives (14%) and the NDP at 10%. The Greens are at 8% in Quebec.

• In the Atlantic provinces, the Liberals (47%) are well ahead of the NDP (26%) and the Conservatives (20%).



We are also testing levels of motivation, by asking people how likely they are to turn out and cast a ballot on election day. Among the 70% of respondents who said they would definitely be voting, the Liberals lead by a 3-point margin: 33% Liberal, 30% Conservative, 21% NDP, 8% BQ and 4% Green. 3% would vote for the People's Party.

### UPSHOT

According to Bruce Anderson: "We'll evaluate events on a continuous basis during this sprint to Election Day. At this point, I'm hesitant to conclude anything about a shift in mood, we're in the middle of summer, engagement levels are uncertain, and parties and leaders have only begun to make their pitches. I'll continue to watch for the same things – will Jagmeet Singh be able to turn interest in him into capturing Liberal votes in key battleground regions, will Erin O'Toole be able to overcome hesitancy about his party and himself personally and will Justin Trudeau make a persuasive and galvanizing case for the policy choices he's advocating especially around vaccines and affordable child care. According to David Coletto: "Within a few weeks, a 12-point Liberal lead has shrunk to a 5-point lead as the race in Ontario and BC has tightened. The NDP has gained a few points while the Conservatives remain stuck just below 30%.

Given that only a portion of this survey was done after the election call, it's too early to say whether the opposition parties' criticism of the early election call is having much impact, but there's some indication that the rise of COVID-19 cases is increasing anxiety and the mood of the public seems to be shifting.

This shift may ultimately play to the Liberal Party's advantage as previous research has found most think the government has handled the pandemic well and support for vaccine mandates is strong across the country. It might expose it to concerns about holding an election during the 4th wave of the pandemic."

# METHODOLOGY

The survey was conducted with 1,500 Canadian adults from August 12 to 16, 2021. A random sample of panelists were invited to complete the survey from a set of partner panels based on the Lucid exchange platform. These partners are typically double opt-in survey panels, blended to manage out potential skews in the data from a single source.

The margin of error for a comparable probability-based random sample of the same size is +/-2.6%, 19 times out of 20.

The data were weighted according to census data to ensure that the sample matched Canada's population according to age, gender, educational attainment, and region. Totals may not add up to 100 due to rounding.

The survey was commissioned and paid for by Abacus Data Inc.

# 42 per cent say they're more hopeful than anxious for economic rebuild, 58 per cent say the opposite


But putting the domestic economy back on track after an unprecedented deliberate slow down elicits different reactions and different preferences from Canadian voters.

New data from the non-profit Angus Reid Institute shows the majority (58%) feel more anxious than hopeful (42%) about the country's near-term economic future.

For those leaning toward hope, the choice is clearly the Liberal Party. Half (53%) among this group say that they will vote for the LPC, compared to just 23 per cent among those more anxious. The first choice for that latter group is the CPC – chosen by 39 per cent. Notably, the NDP is chosen close to equally by both the hopeful (22%) and the anxious (19%).

As the first week of the campaign winds down, vote intent remains consistent – support for all major parties is statistically unchanged over last week – with the incumbent Liberal Party of Canada maintaining a six-point lead over the Conservative Party (36% to 30% respectively). The NDP remains in third place at 20 per cent – well behind the Liberals and the CPC, but well ahead of the Greens. The Bloc Quebecois, polling at six per cent nationally, trails the first place Liberals by 16 points in Quebec (41% to 25% respectively).

# More Key Findings:



# Federal vote intention (Decided and leaning voters, n=1,470)

- The top two issues in the 2021 campaign are the same as 2019: climate change and healthcare. COVID-19 rounds out the top three.
- The Liberal Party holds a 10-point advantage in Ontario after winning the province by nine points in 2019. NDP support in that province is currently up five points compared to the previous election (22% from 17%).
- Albertans are least hopeful about an economic recovery in the coming years. Just 28 per cent feel more hopeful than anxious, while 46 per cent say this in Ontario.




## Part One: Top issues

Canada and the world have faced a year and a half of economic, social, and health challenges due to COVID-19. But when Canadians go to the polls on Sept. 20 to decide which federal party will lead them out of the pandemic and into a new, uncertain reality, many of their top priorities look staggeringly similar to those they identified in 2019.

As the 2021 campaign kicks off, Canadians say climate change and health care are the top two issues facing the country that they care most about. These two issues were most galvanizing in 2019. The new addition: COVID-19 response, chosen by 11 per cent of Canadians as their top national concern. Despite the pandemic, it is climate change that has intensified in the minds of voters over the last two years:




Asked to expand their list of national priorities, a suite of economic issues is chosen by one-in-four Canadians as top concerns in a second tier, alongside the COVID-19 response:



#### **Concern over climate change intensifies**

As COVID-19 concern has diminished compared to the beginning of the year, worry about climate change has risen in its wake. Summer wildfires in parts of the country have only further elevated these levels of concern to their highest mark of the year. Meantime, while the priority for Indigenous issues rose precipitously after the confirmation of unmarked graves at former residential school sites early in summer, levels of concern have declined:



For most voters, climate change is paramount among those who currently say they will support the Liberal Party, NDP or Bloc Quebecois. That said, the federal deficit is now a top issue for both Conservative and BQ supporters as all parties lay out their plans for economic recovery: Election 44: O'Toole preferred among leaders on economy, but Trudeau bests CPC leader head-to-head




# Part Two: Canada's near-term economic future generates hope, anxiety

The coming years will present challenge and opportunity for whichever party forms government. After the largest financial crisis since the Great Depression, the mood of the nation, with a fourth wave already surging, is still largely apprehensive. Three-in-five (58%) say they are more anxious than hopeful about what the next couple of years will bring, while two-in-five (42%) are more upbeat:

#### And thinking about the next couple of years, are you hopeful or anxious about the economic situation of the country? (All respondents, n=1,614)




Notably, Canadians are remarkably consistent across age and gender demographics when considering the hope versus anxiety question. Those over the age of 54 show a slightly more optimistic lean, but all largely voice the same level of anxiety about their country's economic prospects:




Regionally, Ontario residents lead the nation in hope for the economic recovery, but not significantly. Just under half (46%) in Canada's most populous province feel this way. Albertans are most anxious, though many would likely be buoyed by a Conservative victory on Sept. 20: Election 44: O'Toole preferred among leaders on economy, but Trudeau bests CPC leader head-to-head

### Which party and leader are best to lead the rebuild?

If this were a campaign entirely centred on post-pandemic economic growth, Erin O'Toole would be in a relatively advantageous position. Twoin-five (41%) believe he and his party would be best suited to help the economy rebound from its COVID-19-induced malaise, while Justin Trudeau and the Liberals are at 36 per cent.

The Conservatives have been more concrete about their economic plans than the Liberals in the campaign's early days. O'Toole's party has promised to recover the one million jobs lost since the beginning of the pandemic within one year. To do so, a Conservative government will pay half of new hires' salaries for six months after the end of the Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy, as well as providing tax credits and loans to small- and mediumsized businesses. So far, the Liberals have said they will continue current COVID-19 business supports until March 2022, while also promising to subsidize wages and rent in the tourism industry.

One-in-five say Jagmeet Singh and the NDP would be best to lead the country's rebuild over the coming years. Singh has most prominently announced a wealth tax of one per cent on Canadians whose worth exceeds \$10 million to help fund the recovery:




The picture is much less favourable for O'Toole in a direct head-to-head with Trudeau on the question of who is best to rebuild the economy. When presented with the two parties most likely to form government, a majority (56%) of Canadians believe Trudeau and the Liberals are the better choice to "build back better" after the pandemic, while 44 per cent say the same of O'Toole and the Conservatives:

Election 44: O'Toole preferred among leaders on economy, but Trudeau bests CPC leader head-to-head


NDP supporters hold nearly the same amount of belief in Trudeau's ability to grow the economy post-COVID as Liberal supporters. Meanwhile, there are hints at inroads to be made in Quebec for the Conservative party, as three-in-five (61%) Bloc supporters would choose O'Toole over Trudeau in a head-to-head on moving the economy forward post-pandemic:






### Part Three: Liberals lead by six points in vote intention

The official launch of the 2021 federal election campaign has yet to cause significant movement in vote intention. The Liberal Party leads by six points, currently garnering 36 per cent of decided and leaning voters. Threein-ten say they will support the Conservatives on Sept. 20, while one-in-five say they will be voting for the NDP:






Since the beginning of the month, the gap between the Conservatives and the Liberals has been at least five points in each wave of polling:



The three major federal parties are in a statistical tie in B.C., while the Conservatives continue to enjoy majority support in Alberta and Saskatchewan and plurality support in Manitoba. The Liberals garner the highest support in seat-rich Ontario and Quebec, as well as in the Atlantic provinces. The NDP's lowest support is in Quebec, a province that once helped the party reach a historically high seat total in 2011:

While there has been little movement in Ontario for the Conservatives and the Liberals since the 2019 election results, the NDP looks stronger than it did two years ago, currently polling five points higher than its 2019 percentage of popular vote. In Quebec, the Liberals are seven points ahead of where they landed in terms of popular vote in 2019, a gain largely at the expense of the Bloc Quebecois, who are polling seven points lower:



### Survey Methodology:

The Angus Reid Institute conducted an online survey from Aug. 14-17, 2021, among a representative randomized sample of 1,614 Canadian adults who are members of Angus Reid Forum. For comparison purposes only, a probability sample of this size would carry a margin of error of +/- 2.5 percentage points, 19 times out of 20. Discrepancies in or between totals are due to rounding. The survey was self-commissioned and paid for by ARI.




# Vote intention by demographics (i) Q. If a federal election were held tomorrow, which party would you vote for?

This survey was conducted using High Definition Interactive Voice Response (HD-IVR<sup>™</sup>) technology, which allows respondents to enter their preferences by punching the keypad on their phone, rather than telling them to an operator. In an effort to reduce the coverage bias of landline only RDD, we created a dual landline/cell phone RDD sampling frame for this research. As a result, we are able to reach those with a landline and cell phone, as well as cell phone only households and landline only households.

The field dates for this survey are August 16-19, 2021. In total, a random sample of 1,426 Canadians aged 18 and over responded to the survey. The margin of error associated with the total sample is +/- 2.6 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

Please note that the margin of error increases when the results are sub-divided (i.e., error margins for sub-groups such as region, sex, age, education). All the data have been statistically weighted by age, gender, and region to ensure the sample's composition reflects that of the actual population of Canada according to Census data.

Appendix E: Ipsos Canada **Toronto, ON, Aug 17, 2021** — Despite the Prime Minister calling an election that a majority (56%) of Canadians believe should <u>not</u> be held during a pandemic, a new Ipsos poll conducted on behalf of Global News has shown that nothing has changed substantially with party standings even with the official start of the campaign.

If the election were held tomorrow, the results would be very similar to the results of Ipsos' polling last month: the Liberals under Justin Trudeau would receive 36% of the decided popular vote nationally (unchanged since last month), while Erin O'Toole and the Conservatives would receive 31%, up 1 point. Jagmeet Singh's NDP would receive 20% of the popular vote, unchanged, while Annamie Paul and the Green Party would receive the support of 5% of Canadians, up 2 points. The Bloc, led by Yves-Francois Blanchet, would receive 6% of the vote nationally (down 1 point), or 28% in Quebec. Just 1% would vote for Maxime Bernier and the People's Party (down 1 point), and 1% would vote for some other party (down 1 point). Nearly two in ten (17%) Canadians either remain undecided (13%) or would not vote in this election (4%), suggesting that the election is still far from over.

While match point remains elusive for the Liberals, they hold the advantage in some of Canada's most seat-rich provinces:

- In Ontario, the Liberals (40%) hold a lead over the Conservatives (31%), but not enough to earn them the number of seats they need to flirt with a majority government. The NDP (23%), Greens (3%) and others (3%) are further back.
- In **Quebec**, the Liberals (39%) have a double-digit lead over the Bloc (28%), while the Conservatives (17%), NDP (12%), and Greens (4%) trail.
- In British Columbia, the race is tighter with the Liberals (37%) having only a modest lead over the Tories (32%). The NDP is in third (20%), while the Greens (10%) and others (1%) are behind.
- In Alberta, the Tories (53%) have regained their more traditional advantage over the Liberals (19%), NDP (20%), Greens (5%) and others (3%).

- In Saskatchewan and Manitoba, the Conservatives (46%) also have a strong lead over the tied Liberals (23%) and NDP (24%), while the Greens (6%) and others (1%) trail.
- In **Atlantic Canada**, the Liberals (49%) maintain a healthy lead over the Conservatives (21%), NDP (18%), Greens (9%) and others (3%).

These vote figures within the regions would likely fail to produce a meaningful difference to the distribution of seats that presently comprises the House of Commons, suggesting that another minority government remains the likely outcome of this election.

The data also reveal that there are some key differences in voting intentions by gender, and by age:

- Among **men**, the Liberals (36%) and Conservatives (34%) are roughly tied, while the NDP (16%), Green (6%) and Bloc (5%) are behind.
- Among women, the Liberals (37%) enjoy a strong lead over the Tories (28%), NDP (23%), Bloc (7%) and Greens (4%).
- Among **those aged 55+**, the Liberals (39%) and Conservatives (38%) are tied, with the NDP (13%), Greens (5%) and Bloc (3%) struggling.
- Among **those aged 35-54**, the Liberals (37%) also have a strong lead over the Conservatives (28%) and NDP (21%), with the Bloc (8%) and Greens (5%) further behind.
- Among those aged 18-34, the Liberals (32%) and NDP (28%) are fighting for top spot, with the Conservatives (24%) not far behind. The Bloc (9%) and Greens (5%) are trailing.

Moreover, 41% believe the Trudeau government has done a good job and deserves reelection (down 1 point), a figure which sits 5 points above the Liberal vote intention. It seems that many Canadians would give Trudeau a thumbs up for his performance as Prime Minister but are still willing to entertain the possibility of change, with 57% saying it's time for another party to take over.

The quest for a majority is made more difficult by the fact that Canadians are split down the middle as to whether things in Canada are headed in the right direction (48%) or are headed off on the wrong track (50%). The Prime Minister will need to convince Canadians that a future under his continued leadership is better than the alternatives, and that he can steer Canada in the right direction.

### About the Study

These are some of the findings of an Ipsos poll conducted between August 13 and 16, on behalf of Global News. For this survey, a sample of n = 2,001 Canadians aged 18+ was interviewed. A sample of n = 1,501 was interviewed online, via the Ipsos I-Say panel and non-panel sources, and respondents earn a nominal incentive for their participation. A sample of n = 500 Canadians aged 18+ was interviewed by live-interview telephone interviewers by landline and cellphone, using random-digit dialing. Quotas and weighting were employed to balance demographics to ensure that the sample's composition reflects that of the adult population according to Census data and to provide results intended to approximate the sample universe. The precision of Ipsos polls which include nonprobability sampling is measured using a credibility interval. # Out of the Starting Blocks - More of the Same: Liberals 36%, Conservatives 31%, NDP 20%, Bloc 6%, Green 5%

Liberals Lead but Majority not Secure

**Toronto, ON, Aug 17, 2021** — Despite the Prime Minister calling an election that a majority (56%) of Canadians believe should <u>not</u> be held during a pandemic, a new Ipsos poll conducted on behalf of Global News has shown that nothing has changed substantially with party standings even with the official start of the campaign.

If the election were held tomorrow, the results would be very similar to the results of Ipsos' polling last month: the Liberals under Justin Trudeau would receive 36% of the decided popular vote nationally (unchanged since last month), while Erin O'Toole and the Conservatives would receive 31%, up 1 point. Jagmeet Singh's NDP would receive 20% of the popular vote, unchanged, while Annamie Paul and the Green Party would receive the support of 5% of Canadians, up 2 points. The Bloc, led by Yves-Francois Blanchet, would receive 6% of the vote nationally (down 1 point), or 28% in Quebec. Just 1% would vote for Maxime Bernier and the People's Party (down 1 point), and 1% would vote for some other party (down 1 point). Nearly two in ten (17%) Canadians either remain undecided (13%) or would not vote in this election (4%), suggesting that the election is still far from over.

While match point remains elusive for the Liberals, they hold the advantage in some of Canada's most seat-rich provinces:

- In Ontario, the Liberals (40%) hold a lead over the Conservatives (31%), but not enough to earn them the number of seats they need to flirt with a majority government. The NDP (23%), Greens (3%) and others (3%) are further back.
- In **Quebec**, the Liberals (39%) have a double-digit lead over the Bloc (28%), while the Conservatives (17%), NDP (12%), and Greens (4%) trail.
- In **British Columbia**, the race is tighter with the Liberals (37%) having only a modest lead over the Tories (32%). The NDP is in third (20%), while the Greens (10%) and others (1%) are behind.
- In **Alberta**, the Tories (53%) have regained their more traditional advantage over the Liberals (19%), NDP (20%), Greens (5%) and others (3%).
- In **Saskatchewan and Manitoba**, the Conservatives (46%) also have a strong lead over the tied Liberals (23%) and NDP (24%), while the Greens (6%) and others (1%) trail.
- In **Atlantic Canada**, the Liberals (49%) maintain a healthy lead over the Conservatives (21%), NDP (18%), Greens (9%) and others (3%).

These vote figures within the regions would likely fail to produce a meaningful difference to the distribution of seats that presently comprises the House of Commons, suggesting that another minority government remains the likely outcome of this election.

The data also reveal that there are some key differences in voting intentions by gender, and by age:

- Among **men**, the Liberals (36%) and Conservatives (34%) are roughly tied, while the NDP (16%), Green (6%) and Bloc (5%) are behind.
- Among **women**, the Liberals (37%) enjoy a strong lead over the Tories (28%), NDP (23%), Bloc (7%) and Greens (4%).
- Among **those aged 55+**, the Liberals (39%) and Conservatives (38%) are tied, with the NDP (13%), Greens (5%) and Bloc (3%) struggling.
- Among **those aged 35-54**, the Liberals (37%) also have a strong lead over the Conservatives (28%) and NDP (21%), with the Bloc (8%) and Greens (5%) further behind.
- Among **those aged 18-34**, the Liberals (32%) and NDP (28%) are fighting for top spot, with the Conservatives (24%) not far behind. The Bloc (9%) and Greens (5%) are trailing.

Underlying assessments of the Trudeau government remain lukewarm. # METHODOLOGICAL APPROACH



Leger, the largest Canadian-owned polling and marketing research firm, in collaboration with The Canadian Press, conducted this web survey with a representative sample of **2,007 Canadians and 1,005 Americans,** over the age of 18, selected from LEO's (Leger Opinion) representative panel. The questionnaire consisted of 25 questions and was completed in 10 minutes on average. Data collection took place from **August 13<sup>th</sup>, 2021, to August 15<sup>th</sup>, 2021**, via Computer-Assisted Web Interviewing technology (CAWI).

Using 2016 Census reference variables, the Canadian data was then analyzed and weighted by our statisticians according to gender, age, mother tongue, region, education level, presence of children in households, and according to the party they voted for in the last federal election in order to render a representative sample of the general population. Using 2010 U.S. Census reference variables, the American data was then analyzed and weighted by our statisticians according to gender, age, region, race/ethnicity, household size and education level in order to render a representative sample of the general population.

# METHODOLOGICAL APPROACH

The LEO (Leger Opinion) panel is the largest Canadian panel with over 400,000 representative panelists from all regions of Canada. LEO was created by Leger based on a representative Canadian sample of Canadian citizens with Internet access.

LEO's panelists were randomly selected (RDD) through Leger's call centre, panelists from more hard-to-reach target groups were also added to the panel through targeted recruitment campaigns. The double opt-in selection process, a model to detect fraud and the renewal of 25% of the panel each year ensures complete respondent quality. To ensure a higher response rate and reach people on their mobile devices, Leger has also developed a high-performance Apple and Android application.

METHODOLOGY



A margin of error cannot be associated with a non-probability sample in a panel survey. For comparison purposes, a probability sample of this size would have a margin of error  $\pm 2.18\%$ , **19 times out of 20** for the Canadian sample and of  $\pm 3.09\%$ , **19 times out of 20** for the American sample. The results presented in this study comply with the public opinion research standards and disclosure requirements of CRIC (the Canadian Research and Insights Council) and the global ESOMAR network. Leger is a founding member of CRIC and is actively involved in raising quality standards in the survey industry. President Jean-Marc Léger is a member of the CRIC's Board of Directors and the Canadian representative of ESOMAR.



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# EVOLUTION OF VOTING INTENTIONS IN CANADA





































#### **Survey Methodology**

## These are the results of an online survey conducted between August 12<sup>th</sup> 2021 and August 16<sup>th</sup>, 2021.

**Method:** This online survey was conducted using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Dynata, a leading provider of online sample. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

**Sample Size:** n=1,412 Adult Canadians, 18 years or older. The results are weighted to n=1,200 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: August 12th 2021 and August 16th 2021


Weighting: Results are weighted by age, gender, and region to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data; in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported below.







The analysis in this report is based on results of a survey conducted on August 17<sup>th</sup>-19th 2021, among a sample of 1433 adults, 18 years of age or older, living in Canada. The survey was conducted using Interactive Voice Recording. Respondents were interviewed on both landlines and cellular phones. The survey is intended to represent the voting population of Canada.

The survey was conducted by Mainstreet Research and was sponsored by iPolitics.

The sampling frame was derived from both a national telephone directory compiled by Mainstreet Research from various commercially available sources and random digit dialing. The survey that dialed from the directory was conducted as a stratified dial of the ten Canadian provinces. In the case of random digit dials, respondents were asked the additional question of what region of the country they resided in. Respondents were dialed at random.

At least two attempts were made to complete an interview at every sampled telephone number. The calls were staggered over different times of day and two days to maximize the chances of making contact with a potential respondent. ### Forum Research poll finds Tories with slight edge over Liberals

Toronto, Aug 15th, 2021 – The most recent nation-wide poll conducted by Forum Research among eligible Canadian voters shows that if the election were held today most decided / leaning voters would vote Conservative (31%), followed by Liberal (28%), NDP (19%), Green (8%), Bloc Quebecois (7%), and People's Party of Canada (5%).

There are significant regional differences across the country in political party support. In the Atlantic, the gap in political support between Liberals and Conservatives is the smallest, at 33% and 28% respectively. In Quebec, Liberals have a lead at 29%, followed by Bloc Quebecois, the Conservatives, Green Party, and NDP (27%, 16%, 13%, and 9%, respectively).

In the crucial battleground of Ontario, the Conservatives leads with 34% of voting intentions, followed by 31% for the Liberals and 18% for the NDP. In Manitoba / Saskatchewan the Conservatives enjoys a comfortable lead of 40%, followed by the NDP (24%), Liberals (20%), and Green (5%). The Conservative party also has a stronghold in Alberta (46%), followed by the NDP (24%), Liberals (17%), and Green (5%). In British Colombia, Conservatives enjoy a lead of 33%, followed by NDP with 27%, Liberals with 25%, and Green Party at 9%.

These voting intention results, if held on election day, would likely yield approximately 140 Tory seats, 126 Liberal seats, 42 NDP seats, and 26 Bloc Quebecois seats, within a range of approximately plus or minus 10 seats for each party. These results will change as voting intentions change and are subject to the usual margins of error.
